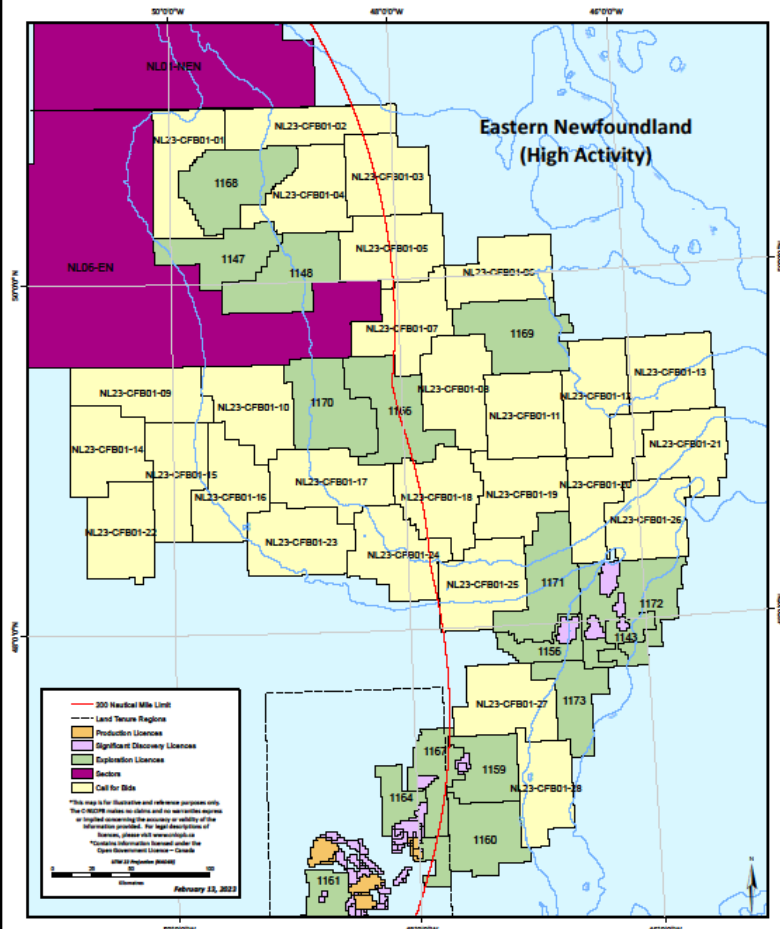

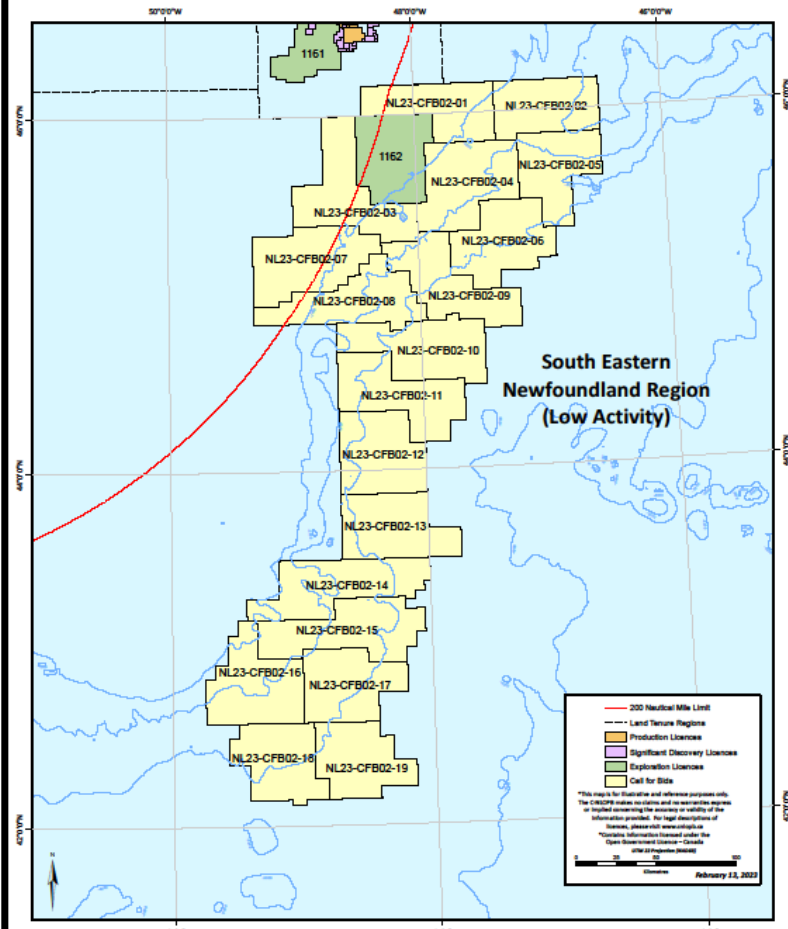
In 2020, oil and gas production in the Newfoundland and Labrador Offshore Area accounted for 1% of Canada's upstream oil and gas sector emissions.

# Call for Bids (Cumulative Parcels) - NL23-CFB01 Eastern Newfoundland Region



Any wells, parcel or license depicted on this map beyond 200 nautical miles off the coast of Newfoundland and Labrador is not represented by the Board to reflect the full extent of Canada's continental shelf beyond 200 nautical miles. Canada has filed a submission regarding the limits of the Outer Continental Shelf to the Atlantic States with the Commission on the Limits of the Continental Shelf, the review of which is pending. Any call for bids based on a sector or parcel identified on this map and any license issued in these areas will be subject to approval and a Production Licence under applicable legislation. The issuance of a licence, parcel or license to areas beyond 200 nautical miles may be required to reflect the limits of the Outer Continental Shelf established by the Commission on the Limits of the Continental Shelf. The issuance of a licence, parcel or license to areas beyond 200 nautical miles may be required. Through legislation, regulations, licence terms and conditions, or otherwise, to make payments or contributions in order for Canada to satisfy obligations under Article 83 of the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea.

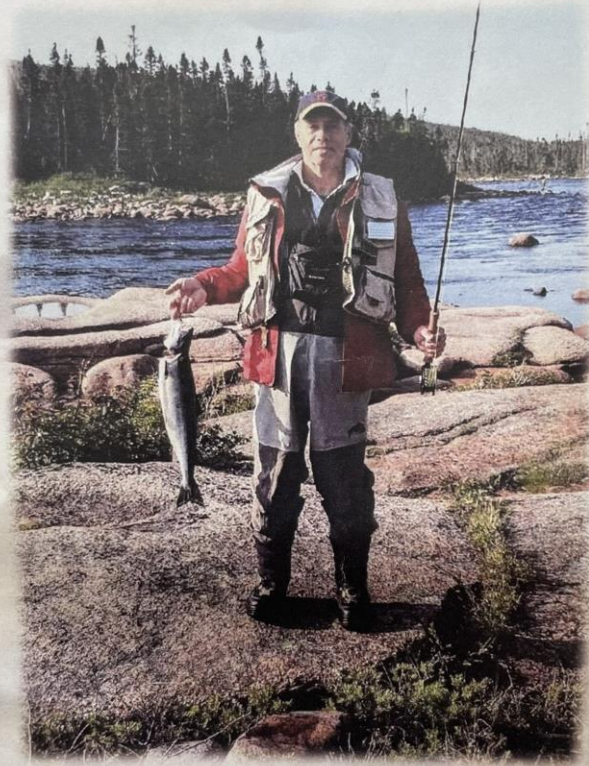
