

Channel-Port aux Basques is the "Gateway" to Newfoundland and is the largest community on the Southwest Coast and is considered the hub of the entire region which has a population of nearly 10,000. The 14 smaller outlying communities use Channel-Port aux Basques for its commercial, retail, professional, recreational, and other related services. Channel-Port aux Basques offers the amenities of any modern region. The Town has infrastructure that can support the oil and gas sector, an ice free harbour, a post secondary institution that is willing to work with new businesses to enhance the current workforce, oceanfront property, and fabrication experience.

The Town Council of Port aux Basques fully supports the development of the oil and gas sector in Western Newfoundland. It is imperative that any development and exploration be conducted in a safe and responsible manner following all environment guidelines established by the Provincial and Federal Government. The Town foresees great potential in the oil and gas sector and believes that if proper steps and measures are taken it is likely that new development opportunities will transpire for this region. Given the Town of Port aux Basques is in close proximity to the Old Harry site, our municipality is prepared to work and develop partnerships with the respective groups to move these development opportunities forward. There is no doubt that our municipality and region as a whole will benefit from the exploration projects on the west coast in the future development stages.


